

HOW DO WE OBTAIN A MARRIAGE LICENSE?

Applicants must complete the marriage license application completely and submit by email, fax, or in-person.

- You must set up an appointment. Appointments may not be the same day as the submittal of your application.
- At the time of appointment, the applicants must provide all required information and documentation.
- Ohio Residents must obtain a license within the county where one of the applicants resides.
- At least one applicant must be a resident of Ashtabula County for the license to be issued by the Ashtabula County ProbateCourt.
- The license is valid anywhere in the State of Ohio for 60 days from the day of issuance.
- Out of State Residents If you are getting married in Ohio, you must obtain a license in the county where the ceremony will take place.
- Applicants under the age of 18 You must file a petition for consent to the marriage of a minor with the Ashtabula County Juvenile Court. A copy of the order must be provided prior to filing the marriage license application.
- Applicants may not be nearer of kin than second cousins and may not have a living spouse.

Do not apply for your Marriage License more than 60 days prior to the ceremony date.

WHAT ARE THE ID REQUIREMENTS FOR OBTAINING A LICENSE?

Applicants must provide identification:
(Copies of Documents must be certified)

- Valid Identification (Driver's License, State ID, Passport, VISA/Green Card)
- Birth Certificate
- Social Security Card
- Prior Marriage Documentation: Divorce
 Decree / Death Certificate (You must supply all previous marriage information)

All marriage licenses are good on the day they are issued. The wedding ceremony must be performed and the license signed and returned within 60 days or the license expires.

WHERE CAN WE GET MARRIED?

Various courts in Ashtabula County perform marriage ceremonies. Times and days may vary.

HOW DO I OBTAIN A COPY OF MY MARRIAGE RECORD?

After your wedding ceremony takes place, the officiant will return a marriage certificate to the Probate Court with all pertinent information regarding the ceremony. Once the Court has received this information, we will issue three certified copies of your marriage record to allow for updating your information with the Social Security Administration, Bureau of Motor Vehicles, Board of Elections, insurance providers and any other agencies or institutions that may require proof of your marriage. We recommend that you retain at least one certified copy of your marriage license in a safe and secure location. If you need additional copies, please request them at the time of marriage license issuance.

WHAT IF I NEED A COPY OF MY LICENSE SEVERAL YEARS AFTER MY WEDDING?

The Probate Court retains a permanent record and index of all marriage licenses issued in Ashtabula County. You may request a copy of your marriage record at any time, by mail, email, or in-person at the Probate Court.
